# Chapter 5:11-6:8

## Last Week's Main Points:

A. What words and images does this passage use to describe the mmature Christian (see especially 5:11, 13; 6:1, 8)? What about the mature Christian (5:14, 6:7)? How does this passage change or inform our understanding of Christian maturity?

- B. Many of us know people who have left the community of faith and are in danger of apostasy. How does this passage challenge your thinking about such people? How does it offer hope to them?
- C. Despite the scolding (5:11-14) and stern warning (6:4-6), this passage, like all of Hebrews, is full of pastoral love and concern. Where do you see evidence of these?

### IV. "You will know them by their fruit" (6:7-8)

- A. "Fruit" imagery throughout the New Testament (Matt 6:15-23, John 15:1-17, Gal 5:22-23)
- B. "The one who perseveres to the end will be saved" (Matt 24:13)
