 - vv. 1-3 The Temptation to Envy
 Surely God is good to Israel,
 To those who are pure in heart!

 ² But as for me, my feet came close to stumbling,
 My steps had almost slipped.

 ³ For I was envious of the arrogant
 As I saw the prosperity of the wicked.
 - vv. 4-12 The (Apparent) Success of the Wicked
 - ⁴ For there are no pains in their death,

And their body is fat.

⁵ They are not in trouble *as other* men,

Nor are they plagued like mankind.

⁶ Therefore pride is their necklace;

The garment of violence covers them.

⁷ Their eye bulges from fatness;

The imaginations of *their* heart run riot.

⁸ They mock and wickedly speak of oppression;

They speak from on high.

⁹ They have set their mouth against the heavens,

And their tongue parades through the earth.

¹⁰ Therefore his people return to this place,

And waters of abundance are drunk by them.

11 They say, "How does God know?

And is there knowledge with the Most High?"

¹² Behold, these are the wicked;

And always at ease, they have increased *in* wealth.

vv. 13-17 – Moving from the Problem to Resolution

¹³ Surely in vain I have kept my heart pure

And washed my hands in innocence;

¹⁴ For I have been stricken all day long

And chastened every morning.

15 If I had said, "I will speak thus,"

Behold, I would have betrayed the generation of Your children.

¹⁶ When I pondered to understand this,

It was troublesome in my sight

¹⁷ Until I came into the sanctuary of God;

Then I perceived their end.

vv. 18-20 – The Reality of Destiny of the Wicked

¹⁸ Surely You set them in slippery places;

You cast them down to destruction.

¹⁹ How they are destroyed in a moment!

They are utterly swept away by sudden terrors!

²⁰ Like a dream when one awakes,

O Lord, when aroused, You will despise their form.

vv. 21-28 – The Reality of the Destiny of the Psalmist

²¹ When my heart was embittered

And I was pierced within,

²² Then I was senseless and ignorant;

I was like a beast before You.

²³ Nevertheless I am continually with You;

You have taken hold of my right hand.

²⁴ With Your counsel You will guide me,

And afterward receive me to glory.

25 Whom have I in heaven but You?

And besides You, I desire nothing on earth.

²⁶ My flesh and my heart may fail,

But God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever.

²⁷ For, behold, those who are far from You will perish;

You have destroyed all those who are unfaithful to You.

²⁸ But as for me, the nearness of God is my good;

I have made the Lord God my refuge,

That I may tell of all Your works.

 - vv. 1-3 Questions and Pleas
 - ¹O God, why have you rejected us forever?

Why does your anger smolder against the sheep of your pasture?

- ²Remember the nation you purchased long ago, the people of your inheritance, whom you redeemed— Mount Zion, where you dwelt.
- ³ Turn your steps toward these everlasting ruins, all this destruction the enemy has brought on the sanctuary.

vv. 4-9 – Protests

- ⁴ Your foes roared in the place where you met with us; they set up their standards as signs.
- ⁵ They behaved like men wielding axes to cut through a thicket of trees.
- ⁶ They smashed all the carved paneling with their axes and hatchets.
- ⁷ They burned your sanctuary to the ground; they defiled the dwelling place of your Name.
- 8 They said in their hearts, "We will crush them completely!"

 They burned every place where God was worshiped in the land.
- ⁹ We are given no signs from God; no prophets are left, and none of us knows how long this will be.

vv. 10-11 – More Questions

- ¹⁰ How long will the enemy mock you, God? Will the foe revile your name forever?
- ¹¹ Why do you hold back your hand, your right hand? Take it from the folds of your garment and destroy them!
- vv. 12-17 Moving from the Problem to Resolution: Recalling God's Past Faithfulness
 - ¹² But God is my King from long ago; he brings salvation on the earth.
 - ¹³ It was you who split open the sea by your power; you broke the heads of the monster in the waters.
 - ¹⁴ It was you who crushed the heads of Leviathan

- and gave it as food to the creatures of the desert.
- ¹⁵ It was you who opened up springs and streams; you dried up the ever-flowing rivers.
- ¹⁶ The day is yours, and yours also the night; you established the sun and moon.
- ¹⁷ It was you who set all the boundaries of the earth; you made both summer and winter.

vv. 18-23 – Final Pleas

- ¹⁸ Remember how the enemy has mocked you, Lord, how foolish people have reviled your name.
- ¹⁹ Do not hand over the life of your dove to wild beasts; do not forget the lives of your afflicted people forever.
- ²⁰ Have regard for your covenant, because haunts of violence fill the dark places of the land.
- ²¹ Do not let the oppressed retreat in disgrace; may the poor and needy praise your name.
- ²² Rise up, O God, and defend your cause; remember how fools mock you all day long.
- ²³ Do not ignore the clamor of your adversaries, the uproar of your enemies, which rises continually.
